Hatton Holiday

stopped.



In Mablethorpe we had lunch in Monty's Fish Bar. The staff were very kind, and we enjoyed our meal. Afterwards we drove to the Mablethorpe Seal Sanctuary. We had dessert and a drink before our tour of all the animals. It was fun to see the meerkats being fed. We

were also able to watch the seals being fed and we learnt a little about why each seal lives at the sanctuary.

On the way back to our cottage we stopped for a walk along the promenade and we drove through Skegness.



On Wednesday morning we visited the Lincolnshire

Aviation Heritage Centre. We started with coffee break (of course!), then had a tour of the airfield. We were able to see 'Just Jane'—one of the few Lancaster bombers that still exist. We had a nice

lunch in the NAFFI and then we drove to Woodhall Spa. In this town we visited the Cottage Museum—which is in a tin house. It was very small!
